Design & Access Statement Summerhouse / office and workshop at South Beck House, Hackness Road, Scalby

1 The Design Component

1.1 Site Appraisal


The summerhouse and workshop have been built on the location where existing buildings in a poor state of repair were located. The buildings are in the garden of a large property set in a seven-acre plot. The property's boundary is formed by mature and newly planted hedges along with mature and semi mature trees. The intension was to re-build using materials that were sympathetic to their location and the main house.

- 1.2 **Amount** The proposal is for the summerhouse and workshop in the garden of South Beck House. The dimensions of the summerhouse are 18m long, 6.5m wide which is split roughly one third office two thirds summerhouse and a workshop of 10m long, 5m wide
- 1.3 **Layout** A plan showing the orientation of and the positioning of the summerhouse and workshop in relation to the existing dwelling is shown on the site drawing.
- 1.4 **Scale** The summer house and workshop will not impact significantly on the site's surroundings or the skyline.
- 1.5 **Landscaping** No special landscaping is intended other than an access path to provide a convenient access to the summer house. Existing trees and newly planted trees on the plot are to remain in place and will shield the summerhouse from general view.
- 1.6 Appearance The summerhouse and workshop are constructed from high quality materials which include specially treated exterior timber cladding. The oak and timber feather board exterior construction will allow the buildings to blend into their surroundings and the handmade bricks around their bases match the main property brickwork. There appearance was designed to replicate old timber barns and outbuildings.
- 1.7 Location The buildings have been sited on the location of demolished buildings. The summerhouse & office are located in a secluded position overlooking the lake which makes good use of this part of the garden. Its position also made good sense as there was already a large concrete foundation in place where the old stables and outbuildings stood, this foundation would have required demolishing instead it was reused. The workshops position was also built on a previous building plot and as there was a lane already serving the building, it made the best location for the workshop, this building is to be used to house the equipment used to maintain the gardens.

2 History

The building plots were originally marketed as two plots in 1942, both plots were purchased and combined to form one large plot. The plot coloured blue was sectioned, and a walled garden was built, the red plot is where the main house was constructed in an arts and craft style.

We understand the land was originally all garden as we now have it and the property next door (south beck cottage) was part of south beck house. This was once the residence of the Head Gardener before being sold. The previous owners were the Wards who owned the steel company in Sherburn. During their ownership the property was used as a multi generation family home. The Ward family purchased the property from Tom Laughton CBE. Mr Laughton played a large part in the village; he was invited to be the president of the Scalby fair committee which grew out of the 1977 Silver Jubilee celebrations for Her Majesty the Queen. Tom Laughton stayed on as President until his death in 1984. The open garden day in Scalby Village was started by Tom Laughton in his garden at Southbeck House but after his death it moved to the Miner's Home. Over the years Southbeck house has been extended, windows have been fitted and buildings were erected that detract from the property's style and beauty. Our intension is to reverse this with sympathetic construction and appropriate style.



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Existing buildings


Prior to the new building being built, a number of existing building were taken down in the same locations. These buildings were serviced by the existing lane that ran down the boundary. The existing buildings had been used for domestic purposes including storage and workshops over the years, even the stables had not been used as stables for many years.

Where the workshop / store has been built there was an existing building with roughly the same floor area. This building had a single pitch roof with the low side to the boundary rising towards the sea cut side. The facia of the old building was approximately 500mm higher than the new buildings facia board. As the new building has a pitched roof to allow for a maintenance lift, it now has a ridge but due to the building being set lower the ridge is only about 500mm higher than the previous buildings roof. A reference point for the old building's facia board is clearly identified due to the trees behind showing abnormal marks where they were resting against the old building.





The summer house was built on the exact same location as the stable block and tack room and the new base merely extended the existing base. The length of the summerhouse takes into account the brick and pan tiled pitched roof building that carried on from the stable block and the other two outbuildings located around and after it.



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
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Original boundary to sea cut

The view from the track was originally obstructed by the vegetation, but as you can see it was poorly managed. We removed all dead and fallen trees and we have subsequently re planted the screen with wild Cherry, Common Hazel, Silver Birch, Downy Birch, Pin Oak, Wych Elm, Goat Willow, Crack Willow, Hawthorn, Black Thorn, Dogwood, Hazel, Field Maple and Crab Apple. In time this will completely obstruct any view into South Beck House from the sea cut track.








