Field plan attached, part of bottom field to be divided into compartments to allow grazing rotation.

The circular area (2) in middle grows longer grass and is only accessed by young horses or those needing more grass than the others.

Large area at bottom (1) is where the herd lives and is designed to create track system, which keeps horses moving more. Our horses have more grass than they need and if kept in standard small paddocks would stand around eating and get even fatter (as well as being bored). Track area also has good natural shelter.

The smaller areas (3,4,5) are designed more as holding areas for those unable to be with the herd. Areas 7 and 8 are observation/holding areas for animals needing regular attention.

The photos taken prior to the last planning meeting show a poached area - this is one part of a large area of just under 10 acres. We understand that the committee were concerned about welfare due to the muddy field. The horses are not being made to live in that photographed muddy area - they have many acres of non muddy areas to go is as they choose. This is not the same as keeping livestock in a confined area - these horses have more than adequate space plus the freedom to go where they like and choose the best place to be. There are no welfare issues keeping horses this way - in fact properties which keep horses singly or in twos in small square paddocks have higher incidences of stress related illness and many other issues, none of which exist in our horses, which considering the appalling abuse some of them have suffered prior to coming here, should indicate that their living conditions are good.

Horses settle well here and thrive - yes they do spend a lot of time playing and running and this does churn some parts of the fields up in wet weather, but this is not permanent and will now be reduced by the field management plan.

The 15 acre field over the road is currently divided into two. It has a herd up there and has good natural shelter. In the past we have also in the past created a track system up there, on the same principle as the lower fields, using electric fencing as we had too much grass.

Due to the wet winters we have had over the last 2 to 3 years the poached areas have grown over with plants other than grass. This has been left (it is topped a few times a year) as it reduces the amount of grass available to the horses but still allows them a large area

to live in.

It has been suggested that some of the horses could be brought in at night in winter to reduce the use of the fields. This is possible, as one side of the barn could easily divided up again to create 10 enclosures as it was in the past for livestock. Some of the horses could share a pen as they are good friends. This would create extra labour as we rarely stable horses normally because they are happier and healthier living outdoors, provided they are well fed and rugged if appropriate.

We are members of the BHS and have appropriate Public and Employer's liability insurance for the site and our off site activities. The BHS guidelines are as such, and it is common knowledge in the horse world that native ponies do not require the same amount of grazing as a full sized horse.

Toilet facilities and alternative medium term accommodation will be funded by selling items and fundraising.


Mud on road (top field) will be less once the area in the gateway has been stoned again.

Mud on the lower farm entrance track will be dealt with when highways are able to sort out maintenance of that short stretch of road, which currently has years worth of silt and mud on top of the stoned surface. We approached the owner of that stretch of road some time ago and offered to improve it by putting additional stone on it, but they refused to let us do it and said highways would deal with it. The trees have not been cut back for years and this causes vehicles to have to drive on the grassy areas to avoid damage to vehicles from branches.

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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

- a) The care and protection of animals in need, by reason of their sickness, maltreatment, neglect or poor circumstances
- b) To provide support and practical help to people needing to rehome their animals
- c) To improve animal welfare through education, information, knowledge and advice relating to the care and training of animals. This reduces the number of future welfare cases
- d) To provide training, work experience and volunteering opportunities to members of the local community

There has been no significant change in these objectives during the year.

Focus of our work

- a) To rescue, rehabilitate and rehome unwanted animals. In order to respond to the ongoing UK horse welfare crisis we have set up a care and rehabilitation centre for unwanted horses and ponies at our farm in Scarborough.
- b) To find long term, caring homes for animals
- c) To maintain our "No Kill" policy we never end the life of a healthy animal for economic or other reasons
- d) The inclusion of people from all backgrounds

Public benefit

The benefits to the public are:

We provide services, practical support and facilities to assist people who are no longer able to keep their animals.

We take in abandoned animals.

We provide volunteer opportunities, education, training and work experience facilities for members of the local community.

Volunteers

At present, animal care at the farm is provided by a mixture of volunteers (both live in and local), unpaid trustees and paid staff. The animal care is labour intensive and involves skilled work, due to many of our rescued horses having health issues and/or behavioural problems. Therefore, volunteers and inexperienced staff require close supervision.

Having volunteers keeps us in touch with the local community and provides us with assistance with labour-intensive tasks around the farm. The volunteer opportunities we provide are of great ongoing benefit to the local community. The volunteers learn useful work related and other skills and some will also benefit from the opportunity to interact with other people. Studies show that working with animals can bring enormous benefits, especially to disadvantaged members of the community and/or those with physical or mental health issues.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Investment performance

We continue to review our objectives on a regular basis. This review considers what we have achieved in the previous 12 months. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. Budgets and forecasts are prepared on a regular basis. Performance this year has been in line with these indicators.

We continue to purchase farm machinery and equipment to help maintain our grazing fields.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The trustees seek to hold reserves in order to meet the future needs of the charity. The trustees aim to keep cash reserves of £5,000.

The freehold land and buildings that the trust owns in order to provide homes for the horses has appreciated in value and the market value of these assets is in the opinion of the trustees, at least £590,000.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

We intend to appoint further trustees to increase the Trust's rate of growth, to introduce additional skills and to work more closely with other charities, especially those that work with disadvantaged or vulnerable members of the local community.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The land within the freehold property is not depreciated.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
