Trees in Conservation Area - The Granary, Aislaby

Thank you for the notification of your intention to carry out work to trees at The Granary which was received by this office on 26 May 2021. I apologise for the delay in sending you a formal reply.

I can confirm that the North York Moors National Park Authority has no objection to the following work:

T1 and T2 Sycamores	Crown reduction towards highway by up to 1m as specified in the attached report
Reasons for consent: Tree crowns are biased towards the road and moderate reductions required to compensate.	

As stated in the Town and Country Planning Act 1990 (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas), the above permission is subject to a six week notification period, with the details recorded in a register open to public inspection. This six week period from the date of notification has now elapsed and therefore the work noted above can be carried out at your earliest convenience within a period of two years and without further reference to myself.

Status of trees Aislaby Conservation area

Species: T1 Sycamore T2 Sycamore

Location:

These semi- mature trees are growing close to the boundary hedge on the eastern side of Aislaby Lane.

Proposal:

Described as pollarding of branches overhanging road in both cases.

Amenity value: The trees are prominent when traveling along Aislaby Lane as the road bends in a northerly direction.

Appraisal: (see photographs below supplied by the applicant)

From the photograph supplied by the applicant the trees are fairly elongated specimens growing in close proximity to one another and other sycamores in a line along the property boundary. The crowns are bias on the road side.

Conclusion:

Whilst it is accepted that the crowns are bias on the road side in my opinion pruning should be limited to the reduction of individual branched by a maximum of 1.0m as over zealous pruning will encourage a profusion of new growths from the cut surfaces which could become a hazard in future. The limits of pruning are demonstrated on the photograph below.
