### **Background**

Wykeham Forest comprises approximately 15 square kilometres of commercial conifer forestry located some 10km west of Scarborough. There are various forestry tracks and a few public roads and PROW through the forest, including the Tabular Hills Walk and Moors to Sea cycle route.

The application site lies approx. one kilometre west of the raptors viewing point deep within the forestry woodland, some 70m back from the Tabular Hills walk and Sustrans Moors to Sea cycle route. Access is via an existing firebreak in the woodland cover. The tree canopy height in the vicinity is approx. 20-22 m high.

Earlier this year permission was granted for a 25m mast of an almost identical nature.

Permission is now sought for a 30m high lattice mast to support: 9 antennae, 6 transmission dishes and 6 equipment cabinets. The equipment is greater than normal as this is a 'shared rural network' collaboration between: Three, Telefonica & Vodafone to provide rural 'notspot' mobile phone and mobile broadband coverage. It would be contained in a 2m high fenced compound.

Planning permission is required as the Permitted Development height for mast at the time of submission was 25m, and this exceeds the PD height limit.

The application is supported by a supporting statement contains: an ICNIRP certificate in respect of compliance with health protection, a summary of alternative site considered, pre-application consultation with local communities, and an offer that the mast could be coloured if required by the LPA. The Authority's ecologists have recommended that bird and bat informatives be added to any approval and a bird nest condition for non-disturbance be imposed.

#### Main issues

#### **Local Plan**

Local Plan policy BL10 supports provision of telecommunications infrastructure that meets the neds of local communities where it meets various criteria including: no alternative, no adverse landscape impact, least environmentally intrusive option, part of a wider communications strategy and provision is made for removal if no longer required. Both this and earlier 25m applications were the subject of positive preapplication advice.

Even with the extra 5m height above the recently approved mast at the site, the site is considered to be well chosen and would not even be intrusive in close views from the adjacent PROW's and accords with Local Plan policy BL10 and as such approval is recommended.

#### **Pre-commencement conditions**

There are no pre-commencement conditions.

#### Contribution to Management Plan objectives

Approval is considered likely to help support meeting outcome 6 local communities, objective 24 to facilitate broadband and mobile phone coverage to 100% by 2030.
