## **Background**

The development site is a field off Low Wood Lane, north of Wind Hill Farm in the open countryside of Glaisdale.

Currently running along the southern boundary of the field is an informal track and public footpath. There are no buildings or other development within this field. This application seeks planning permission for the creation of a formal twin trod track to help walkers through an improved surface and also aid vehicular access to the farm's re-sited manure heap, preventing poaching of nearby grassland. The track will run for approximately 100 metres from the farm gate at a minimum width of 2.4 metres. There is an existing access point to the field from which the proposed track will run.

#### Main issues

#### **Local Plan Policies**

Strategic Policy C relates to the quality and design of development within the National Park. The policy seeks to ensure that proposed development maintains and enhances the distinctive character of the National Park through appropriate siting, orientation, layout and density together with carefully considered scale, height, massing and form. Proposals should incorporate good quality construction materials and design details that reflect and complement the architectural character and form of the original building and/or that of the local vernacular.

Policy BL6 relates specifically to proposed tracks. The policy states that Proposals to install, alter or extend tracks will only be permitted where the scale and alignment of the track and the proposed materials will not have an adverse impact on the landscape and special qualities of the National Park. There must also be compelling evidence of a need for the track to directly support an established agricultural or forestry use and the scale and nature of the development is commensurate with that need. It must be demonstrated that no existing roads or tracks are suitable and that alternative arrangements cannot be made to meet the identified need for the track and that there will not be an unacceptable impact on any known historic or archaeological features. The works will not adversely affect ecological assets, including impacts arising from habitat loss, drainage or disturbance. Appropriate design, construction methods and materials are used to reduce the visual impact of the track on the wider landscape.

#### **Discussion**

The development site is within the open countryside and therefore the introduction of a formal track has the potential to have a detrimental impact on the character of the surrounding area. New or altered tracks across this landscape can be readily visible from public vantage points and can appear as a scar on the landscape for many years. Nevertheless, there may be circumstances where a new track or the alteration, improvement or extension of an existing track would bring significant land management benefits. In such cases the Authority will support proposals which are sensitively designed and help to maintain the distinctive quality of the National Park's landscape, biodiversity and natural environment.

In this instance the track will improve an existing public right of way, as well as improving vehicular access to the farm's re-sited manure heap, preventing poaching of nearby grassland. The track will approximately 100 metres from the farm gate at a minimum width of 2.4 metres along the southern boundary of the field. The proposed track sits tight to the boundary of the field, which is planted with mixed hedgerows and trees to aid in visual screening and will be constructed of appropriate materials that will blend nicely into the landscape.

It is not considered that the proposed development will be harmful to the character of the surrounding area or local habitats and as such the application is recommended for approval.

#### Explanation of how the Authority has worked positively with the applicant/agent

The Authority's Officers have appraised the scheme against the Development Plan and other material considerations and confirmed to the applicant/agent that the development is likely to improve the economic, social and environmental conditions of the area.
