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#### Background

Planning permission is sought for the erection of a bird blind (open backed bird hide) on Brown Rigg Moor approx. 300 metres to the west of Grouse Hill Caravan Park to be used for scientific bird study and educational purposes carried out by the Hawk and Owl Trust. Given its proposed location, the hide would also be open to walkers to use for recreational purposes. There is no vehicular access to the site and pedestrian access will be via a permissive footpath through Grouse Hill Caravan Park and a track across the moor.

The application site lies within close proximity to the North York Moors Special Protection Area (SPA) and Special Area of Conservation (SAC) which are European designated sites, and also within the Biller Howe Dale SSSI and close proximity to the North York Moors SSSI.

#### Main Issues

The relevant policies of the Core Strategy and Development Policies Document are Core Policies C which seeks to ensure that the quality and diversity of the natural environment is conserved and enhanced, and to maintain, and where appropriate enhance conditions for priority habitats and species identified in the North York Moors Local Biodiversity Action Plan.

The application site lies within close proximity to the North York Moors Special Protection Area (SPA) and Special Area of Conservation (SAC) which are European designated sites. As the proposal is not necessary for the management of the designated site, it is necessary to assess whether the proposal is likely to have a significant effect on the integrity of the site. In addition the application site lies within the Biller Howe Dale SSSI and within close proximity to the North York Moors SSSI; therefore it is also necessary to assess whether the proposal is likely to damage or destroy the interest features for which the SSSI's have been notified.

Initially Natural England objected to the proposal on the grounds that insufficient information had been submitted to adequately assess the impact of the proposal in those designated sites. However the applicant has responded to the questions raised and submitted the additional information requested such that Natural England is now satisfied the identified impacts on Biller Howe Dale SSSI as well as the North York Moors Special Area of Conservation (SAC), Special Protected Area (SPA) and SSSI can be appropriately mitigated with measures secured via planning conditions as advised and withdraw their objection.

With regard to the landscape impact, the area is characterised by open, undeveloped areas of moorland which maintain panoramic views and a sense of wildness, where new fencing and other man-made infrastructure should be discouraged. However the proposal is for the siting of a relatively small scale open-backed bird hide on a remote part of Brown Rigg Moor where the impacts are likely to be relatively small. The site is not particularly prominent

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or exposed and whilst the proposed hide would be visible from across the other side of the valley which separates Brown Rigg Moor from Fylingdales Moor, it would not be detrimental to the landscape of this part of the Park.

Whilst approval may set a precedent for other bird hides or man-made structures, each case must be dealt with on its own merits. This proposal would meet with the statutory purposes of the National Park; it would have limited impact on the natural beauty and wildlife of the Park whilst promoting opportunities for the understanding and enjoyment of the special qualities of the Park by the public. As such approval is recommended.
